'We were founded upon the conception of the common man, not as a means but an end, not as a cog in a vast machine but as an individual being of infinite worth, of vast undeveloped potentialities.'

In 1867 the Bedford Institute Association (BIA) was born, transforming into Quaker Social Action (QSA) in 1998. We were named in memory of Peter Bedford (1780-1864) a Quaker, silk merchant and pioneer philanthropist. Over the 150 years of our work, much has changed yet some common threads remain.

One thing has remained constant; a determination to live up to our name; to be Quaker in values, social in concern and absolutely action oriented.

...much has changed...

- 1. Face of poverty has changed from the wretched slums of Victorian London to the material and emotional poverty of today.
- What we do, and how we do it has changed

 historically our work was often expressed
 in spiritual terms. Our locations and reach has
 changed. We work in east London and beyond.

...some common threads remain...

- 1. Putting people at the heart of what we do our entire purpose is to listen and respond to the needs of people living in poverty.
- 2. Doing more by working with others; volunteers and partners – we have always relied on volunteers, and worked with partners, to help us stretch our resources.
